A highly skilled craft, masonry requires precision and artistic skill. Most impressive buildings across the US are made of masonry and the masons who work on those buildings take great pride in their work on the buildings that stand the test of time. No other material leaves as lasting an impression of strength, quality and substance as that conveyed by brick, block and stone.

WHAT DOES A MASON DO?

Masons work with a variety of building materials including brick, block and glass block, tile, terra cotta, natural and cast stone. The work ranges from laying a wall to constructing building exteriors to high rise buildings using a variety of these materials. The work is physical and involves the use of hand tools, power tools and material moving equipment. Brick and block are laid by hand, requiring the skill of a craftsman, who is a true artist. Masons must also be able to read blueprints, understand building codes and be knowledgeable of industry safety requirements and guidelines for handling hazardous materials.

As with many construction trades, masonry work is done outdoors. In the past, weather conditions often affected work schedules but today, protective sheeting encloses work areas which allows masons to work continuously throughout the year.

TRAINING

To become a journeyman mason, one must complete an apprenticeship or other approved training program. Secondary school programs at Vocational Technical Centers provide approved training to allow a student to work for a mason contractor at the entry level immediately after
